Primary Survey: The ABCDE Approach

- **A - Airway with cervical spinal motion restriction:** Assessing patency, suctioning, inserting an oral or nasal airway, and preparing for definitive airway management.
- **B - Breathing and Ventilation:** Auscultating breath sounds, assessing chest wall motion, identifying tension pneumothorax, flail chest, or open pneumothorax.
- **C - Circulation and Hemorrhage Control:** Checking pulses, skin color, capillary refill, and applying direct pressure or tourniquets for external bleeding.

- **E - Exposure and Environmental Control:** Fully undressing the patient while preventing hypothermia.

Secondary Survey and Adjuncts

Injury-Specific Management

Special Populations in Trauma

The TNCC also covers how trauma affects vulnerable groups:

- **Pediatric Trauma:** Unique anatomical and physiological differences (larger head, higher metabolic rate, thinner chest wall). Recognize that children compensate well but can deteriorate rapidly.
- **Geriatric Trauma:** Age-related changes (decreased reserve,

brittle bones, anticoagulant use).
Falls are a common mechanism.

- **Pregnant Trauma:** Physiologic changes of pregnancy, assessing fetal well-being, and recognizing placental abruption.
- **Bariatric Trauma:** Challenges with airway management, positioning, and diagnostics.
