TROUBLESHOOTING COMMON ISSUES WHEN MAKING SNOW GLOBES

Cloudy Water

Leaking Lid

If your snow globe leaks, the sealant was not applied evenly or did not cure fully. Remove the lid, clean off the old sealant, and apply a fresh, generous bead. Allow it to cure for a full 24 hours before testing again.

Figurine Floating or Moving

This usually happens when the adhesive is not waterproof or has not cured completely. Use a strong epoxy or silicone designed for underwater use. Ensure the lid surface is clean and dry before gluing. For heavy figurines, consider attaching them to a small weight or base before gluing to the lid.

HOW TO MAKE SNOW GLOBES WITH CHILDREN
