# The Convention Was Not Initially

It was only after weeks of intense debate that delegates like James Madison and Alexander Hamilton pushed for an entirely new framework. The windows of Independence Hall were kept shut, even in the sweltering Philadelphia summer, to keep

their deliberations private.

## Rhode Island Boycotted the Convention

A fascinating piece of trivia: Rhode Island, famously independent and suspicious of federal power, refused to send any delegates to the Constitutional Convention. The "Ocean State" feared that a strong central government would trample state sovereignty and its lucrative maritime trade. As a result, Rhode Island was the last of the original thirteen states to ratify the Constitution, doing so only in 1790, after the new

government was already operational and after Congress threatened to treat it as a foreign entity.

## The Signing Was Nearly Sabotaged

The final days of the convention were tense. On September 17, 1787, as delegates prepared to sign, delegate George Mason of Virginia proposed a bill of rights. The motion was defeated unanimously by the state delegations present. Then, delegate Elbridge Gerry of Massachusetts objected, arguing the document lacked sufficient safeguards.

Ultimately, Gerry, Mason, and Edmund Randolph refused to sign. Had a few more key figures joined their protest, the Constitution might have faced an even more difficult path to ratification. ## The Original First Amendment Was Not About Free Speech

## The 27th Amendment Took 202 Years to Ratify

Speaking of the 27th Amendment, it is a trivia goldmine. Proposed in 1789 as part

of the original Bill of Rights, it stated that any law changing the pay of members of Congress could not take effect until after the next election. It received only six state ratifications by 1792 and was largely forgotten. In the 1980s, a Texas university student rediscovered it and started a campaign to get it ratified. It finally became law in 1992, a staggering 202 years later.

## The Prohibition Amendment Had a Time Limit

The 18th Amendment (Prohibition) was unique in that it included a seven-year

time limit for ratification. This was the first time Congress had set a deadline. When Prohibition was repealed by the 21st Amendment, it became the only amendment ever to be repealed by another. # Unratified

The ERA, first proposed in 1923 and passed by Congress in 1972, fell three states short of the required 38 for ratification. A deadline was set, and it expired.
