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### **WHAT FOODS ARE ALLOWED ON A LOW SODIUM DIET?**

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One of the most common misconceptions is that a low sodium diet

is bland and restrictive. In reality, it encourages a vibrant, flavorful way of eating that prioritizes fresh ingredients. Here is a breakdown of what you can enjoy.

## Fresh Fruits and Vegetables

All fresh, frozen (without added sauces), and canned (rinsed, no salt added) fruits and vegetables are excellent choices. They are naturally low in sodium and rich in potassium, which helps counteract the effects of sodium on blood pressure.

## Lean Proteins

## Whole Grains

## Dairy and Alternatives

Unsalted nuts, seeds, avocados, olive oil, and nut butters are sodium-free and add richness to meals. Always check the label on nut butters, as some brands add salt.

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### FOODS TO LIMIT OR AVOID ON A LOW SODIUM DIET

- **Cheese and dairy products:**

While natural cheese contains sodium, processed cheese foods and cheese spreads are even higher. Limit intake or choose low-sodium options.

- **Bread and baked goods:** Many commercially baked breads, bagels, and muffins contain surprising amounts of salt. Read labels and look for varieties with 100 mg or less per slice.

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### **PRACTICAL TIPS FOR STARTING A LOW SODIUM DIET**

## Cook More Meals at Home
