You will typically work with a freight forwarder who will arrange the booking, documentation, and delivery to the airport in the USA, after which a local agent handles import clearance and final delivery.

Sea Freight (Full Container Load and Less than Container Load)

When cost efficiency is the priority and transit time is flexible, sea freight is the undisputed champion. **Shipping from Australia to USA** by sea is the most economical method, especially for large volumes, heavy machinery, furniture, or non-perishable goods. Customs Duties, Taxes, and Brokerage Fees
