Example 2: A Negative Coefficient

Solve: $2x^2 - 4x - 6 = 0$
Here, $a = 2$, $b = -4$, and $c = -6$. Be careful with the negative signs when substituting:
$$x = \frac{-(-4) \pm \sqrt{(-4)^2 - 4 \cdot 2 \cdot (-6)}}{2 \cdot 2}$$

$$x = \frac{4 \pm \sqrt{(16 + 48)}}{4}$$
$$x = \frac{4 \pm \sqrt{64}}{4}$$
$$x = \frac{4 \pm 8}{4}$$

This gives: $x = (4 + 8) / 4 = 12 / 4 = 3$, and $x = (4 - 8) / 4 = -4 / 4 = -1$.
The solutions are 3 and -1.

Example 3: A Discriminant That Is Not a Perfect Square

Solve: $x^2 + 2x - 4 = 0$
Here, $a = 1$, $b = 2$, and $c = -4$.
$$x = \frac{-2 \pm \sqrt{2^2 - 4 \cdot 1 \cdot (-4)}}{2 \cdot 1}$$
$$x = \frac{-2 \pm \sqrt{4 + 16}}{2}$$
$$x = \frac{-2 \pm \sqrt{20}}{2}$$

Since $\sqrt{20} = \sqrt{4 \cdot 5} = 2\sqrt{5}$, we can simplify:
$$x = \frac{-2 \pm 2\sqrt{5}}{2}$$
$$x = -1 \pm \sqrt{5}$$

So the two solutions are $-1 + \sqrt{5}$ and $-1 - \sqrt{5}$. This example is particularly important because it shows how to handle irrational solutions, which are common when working through a **Solving Using The Quadratic Formula Worksheet**.
