the Common Core Georgia Performance Standards Math place a strong emphasis on eight Mathematical Practices. These practices describe the processes and proficiencies that students should develop throughout their mathematical education. They include:

The Mathema tical Practices: The Heart of CCGPS Math

Beyond the specific content students learn,

- **Make sense of problems and persevere in solving them.**

Students learn to analyze problems, consider different strategies, and persist even when solutions are not immediately obvious.

- **Reason abstractly and quantitatively.**

Students move

between the abstract world of numbers and the concrete context of real-world situations.

- **Construct viable arguments and critique the reasoning of others.** Students learn to explain their thinking clearly and listen to the reasoning of their peers.
- **Model with mathematics.** Students apply mathematical concepts to everyday problems, using tools like graphs, tables, and equations.
- **Use appropriate tools strategically.** Students become

proficient with calculators, rulers, protractors, and digital tools, knowing when and why to use them.

- **Attend to precision.** Students communicate clearly, using accurate mathematical language and symbols.
- **Look for and make use of structure.** Students recognize patterns and relationships within mathematical systems.
- **Look for and express regularity in repeated reasoning.**

Students notice when processes repeat and use that insight to solve problems efficiently.

These practices are not separate from content but are woven into every lesson. For instance, a first-grade teacher might ask students to explain how they solved a word problem, encouraging them to construct viable arguments. A high school algebra teacher might ask students to model a business scenario using linear equations. By embedding these practices into daily instruction, CCGPS Math helps students think like mathematicians, not just memorize procedures.

Grade-Level Breakdown of CCGPS Math

Understanding the progression of the Common Core Georgia Performance Standards Math across grade levels can help parents and educators see the big picture. The standards are organized into three major bands: elementary (K-5), middle school (6-8), and high school (9-12).

ELEMENTARY

SCHOOL: BUILDING A STRONG FOUNDATION

Grades six through eight mark a critical transition period. Students move from arithmetic to pre-algebra and algebra, preparing for the more formal mathematics of high school. In sixth grade, students learn ratios and proportional relationships, which are foundational for understanding rates and percentages. Seventh grade introduces more complex proportional reasoning, operations with rational numbers, and an introduction to probability and statistics. By eighth grade, students are expected to master linear equations and functions, laying the groundwork for high school algebra and

geometry.

The Common Core Georgia Performance Standards Math at the middle school level also emphasize geometry in a more formal way. Students learn about angles, congruence, similarity, and the Pythagorean theorem, applying these concepts to solve real-world problems like finding distances or designing structures. The goal is to ensure that all students are prepared for college-level mathematics and for technical careers that require mathematical literacy. Algebra I, Geometry, and Algebra II form the core pathway, with advanced courses like Precalculus and Statistics available for those pursuing STEM fields.

One of the strengths of CCGPS Math in high school is the emphasis on mathematical modeling. Students use functions, equations, and statistical methods to analyze real-world data, such as population growth, economic trends, or

scientific experiments. This practice helps students see the power of mathematics as a tool for understanding the world. Additionally, the standards stress the importance of proof and rigorous justification, especially in geometry, where students learn to write formal deductive proofs.

How CCGPS Math Differs from Previous
