

Story Of The Miraculous Medal

The First Apparition: July 18, 1830

The Apparition of Mary with Rays of Light

The pivotal moment in the **Story Of The Miraculous Medal** took place during evening meditation on Saturday, November 27, 1830. Catherine saw the Virgin Mary standing on a globe, with her feet crushing the head of a serpent. Her hands were outstretched, and from her fingers shone brilliant rays of light. Around the image, an oval frame appeared, inscribed with golden letters: "**O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee.**"

The Reverse Side of the Medal

As Catherine watched, the vision turned to show the reverse of the medal. It featured twelve stars encircling a large letter **M**, surmounted by a cross. Below the **M** were two hearts side by side: one crowned with thorns (representing the Sacred Heart of Jesus) and the other pierced by a sword (representing the Immaculate Heart of Mary). The entire design was encircled by a border of stars.

The Virgin then spoke a clear instruction: "**Have a medal struck according to this model. All who wear it will receive great graces, especially if they wear it around the neck. Graces will be abundant for those who wear it with confidence.**"

Resistance and Perseverance

Despite the clarity of the vision, Catherine knew she could not simply order a medal. She confided in her spiritual director, Father Jean Marie Aladel, a priest of the Vincentian order. Father Aladel was initially skeptical, as the Church is always cautious about private revelations. He questioned Catherine repeatedly, seeking signs of delusion or pride. Yet her unwavering humility, simplicity, and consistency convinced him that something authentic was occurring. For nearly two years, Catherine patiently endured his scrutiny, all the while the **Story Of The Miraculous Medal** awaited its physical form.

The First Medals Are Struck

Finally, in 1832, after consultation with ecclesiastical authorities, permission was granted to produce the medal. The first batch of 20,000 medals was struck in June 1832, just as a devastating cholera epidemic was sweeping through Paris. The medals were distributed freely to the sick, the suffering, and the faithful. Almost immediately, reports of extraordinary healings, conversions, and protections began to pour in. The medal quickly became known as "Miraculous" by popular acclamation, even though the Church officially called it the "Medal of the Immaculate Conception."

SYMBOLISM AND SPIRITUAL MEANING

The Front: Graces Flowing to Humanity

The front image of the Virgin standing on the globe with her hands outstretched conveys her role as the Mediatrix of all graces. The serpent crushed underfoot references the Protoevangelium in Genesis 3:15, where God promises that the woman will crush the head of the serpent (evil). The rays of light from her hands symbolize the graces she obtains for humanity. The inscription, "**O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee**", affirms the Catholic dogma of the Immaculate Conception (defined officially in 1854, but already deeply held in tradition) and invites a direct plea for intercession.

The Reverse: The Cross, the Hearts, and the Letter M

- **The Cross and the Letter M:** The cross represents the salvation of Christ. The **M** stands for Mary, but also for her maternal role at the foot of the cross. Together, they symbolize the inseparable union between Jesus and His Mother in the work of redemption.
- **The Two Hearts:** The Sacred Heart of Jesus (crowned with thorns) and the Immaculate Heart of Mary (pierced by a sword) represent the love and suffering of Christ and Mary for humanity. The thorns and sword point to their shared sorrow in the Passion.
- **The Twelve Stars:** They evoke the woman of the Apocalypse (Revelation 12:1) and symbolize the twelve tribes of Israel and the twelve apostles, indicating the universality of the Church.

THE SPREAD OF DEVOTION AND MIRACLES

From Paris to the World

The **Story Of The Miraculous Medal** spread with astonishing speed. By 1836, an ecclesiastical commission examined Catherine's accounts and declared the apparitions to be authentic. The medal's popularity exploded across Europe, the Americas, Asia, and Africa. It became especially associated with the propagation of the dogma of the Immaculate Conception, which Pope Pius IX defined in 1854. Four years later, in 1858, the Virgin Mary appeared to Saint Bernadette Soubirous at Lourdes and identified herself as "the Immaculate Conception," echoing the medal's inscription.

Notable Miracles and Conversions

Numerous miraculous events have been attributed to the medal. Among the most famous:

- **The conversion of Alphonse Ratisbonne:** In 1842, an agnostic Jewish banker in Rome agreed to wear the medal as a jest. Shortly after, he experienced a profound vision of the Virgin Mary and converted, later becoming a priest and missionary.
- **Protection during war and epidemics:** Soldiers in both World Wars, as well as countless individuals facing cholera, typhus, and other

diseases, reported remarkable recoveries and safety after wearing the medal with faith.

- **Countless healings:** Records at the Chapel of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal on Rue du Bac contain thousands of testimonies of healings from cancer, paralysis, and other serious conditions.

THE CHAPEL AND THE INCORRUPT BODY OF SAINT CATHERINE

Today, the Chapel of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal on Rue du Bac in Paris remains one of the most visited pilgrimage sites in the world. Pilgrims come to pray before the very chair where the Virgin sat, now encased in glass. Nearby, the incorrupt body of Saint Catherine Labouré lies in a glass reliquary. She died on December 31, 1876, and was canonized in 1947. Her body shows no signs of decay, a sign that many faithful see as a further

confirmation of the **Story Of The Miraculous Medal** and her holiness.
