216-digit number as mystical, which is not real math. In general, filmmakers take liberties to serve the story. However, many films employ mathematics consultants to maintain a semblance of accuracy. The best ones balance truth with narrative drive, making the audience feel the thrill of discovery even if the details are tweaked.
