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## WHAT IS THE KAUFMAN BRIEF INTELLIGENCE TEST?

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The KBIT was developed by Alan S. Kaufman and Nadeen L. Kaufman, two prominent figures in the field of psychological assessment. It was first

published in 1990 and later revised in 2004 to become the KBIT-2, which is the version most commonly used today. The test is designed to assess intelligence in individuals aged 4 to 90 years, making it one of the most versatile brief intelligence measures available.

The test measures two main domains of intelligence:

- **Verbal intelligence** – This includes vocabulary, general knowledge, and the ability to reason using language.
- **Nonverbal intelligence** – This assesses the ability to solve problems using visual and spatial information without relying on language.

The KBIT-2 provides three main scores: a

Verbal score, a Nonverbal score, and a composite IQ score known as the IQ Composite. This composite score is an overall estimate of intellectual functioning and is often used to identify giftedness, intellectual disabilities, or learning difficulties.

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### WHY IS THE KBIT USED?

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The KBIT is used in a variety of settings for different purposes. Here are some of the most common applications:

- **Educational screening** – Schools may use the KBIT to identify students who need additional support or enrichment programs.
- **Clinical assessment** – Psychologists and neuropsychologists use the KBIT to

get a quick estimate of cognitive functioning during evaluations.

- **Research** – Because it is brief and easy to administer, the KBIT is frequently used in studies where intelligence is a variable of interest.
- **Placement decisions** – Some programs use the KBIT to determine eligibility for gifted and talented programs or special education services.

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The KBIT-2 is divided into three subtests that measure different aspects of intelligence. These subtests are designed to be engaging and relatively straightforward, minimizing the need for extensive instructions or prior knowledge.

## Verbal Knowledge

This subtest measures receptive vocabulary and general information. The examinee is shown a series of pictures and asked to point to the one that best matches a word or concept spoken by the examiner. For example, the

examiner might say, "Show me the animal that lives in the ocean," and the examinee would need to choose from a set of pictures including a fish, a bird, a dog, and a cat.

## Matrices

This subtest assesses nonverbal reasoning and problem-solving abilities. The examinee is presented with a matrix or pattern that has a missing piece and must select the correct piece from several options. This is similar to the matrix reasoning tasks found in other intelligence tests and requires the examinee to identify relationships, sequences, and analogies in visual stimuli.

### STRUCTURE OF THE KBIT-2

## SAMPLE QUESTIONS FROM THE Verbal Fluency

This subtest measures expressive verbal ability and the capacity to generate words under specific constraints. The examinee is asked to name as many items as possible within a given category, such as "animals" or "things you eat for breakfast," within a limited time. This subtest is only administered to older children and adults, as it requires a certain level of language development.

A typical **Kbit Intelligence Test Sample** will include items from all three subtests, giving you a clear picture of the types of questions asked and the skills being measured.

## Verbal Knowledge Sample Items

The examiner shows a page with four pictures. The examiner says a word or phrase, and the examinee points to the correct picture.

- **Example 1:** "Show me the triangle." (The page shows a circle, a square, a triangle, and a star.)
- **Example 2:** "Which one is used to tell time?" (The page shows a book, a clock, a chair, and a shoe.)
- **Example 3:** "Point to the vehicle that flies." (The page shows a car, a boat, an airplane, and a bicycle.)

## Matrices Sample Items

The examinee sees a matrix of images or shapes with one missing. Below are four or five options, and the examinee must choose the one that completes the pattern.

- **Example 1:** A 2x2 matrix shows a red circle in the top left, a blue circle in the top right, a red square in the bottom left, and a blank in the bottom right. The answer is a blue square, following the pattern of color and shape.
- **Example 2:** A 3x3 matrix shows a progression of shapes that grow in size or rotate. The examinee must identify the missing shape that continues the logical sequence.
- **Example 3:** A 2x2 matrix shows a picture of a hand on the left and a glove on the right in the top row. The bottom left shows a foot. The missing piece would be a sock, following the same relationship.

# Verbal Fluency Sample Items

The examiner gives a category and asks the examinee to name as many items as possible within a set time, usually 30 seconds to one minute.

- **Example 1:** "Name as many fruits as you can."
- **Example 2:** "Name as many things that are cold as you can."
- **Example 3:** "Name as many occupations or jobs as you can."

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## HOW THE KBIT IS SCORED

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The KBIT-2 produces three types of scores: raw scores, standard scores, and percentile ranks. Raw scores are simply the number of items answered correctly. These raw scores are then converted into standard scores based on the examinee's age group. Standard scores have a mean of 100 and a standard deviation of 15, which is the same scale used by most major intelligence tests.

The three standard scores are:

- **Verbal Score** – Based on performance in the Verbal Knowledge and Verbal Fluency subtests.
- **Nonverbal Score** – Based on

performance in the Matrices subtest.

- **IQ Composite** – A combination of the Verbal and Nonverbal scores, providing an overall estimate of intellectual functioning.

In addition to standard scores, percentile ranks are provided to show how the examinee compares to others of the same age. For example, a percentile rank of 75 means the examinee scored higher than 75 percent of peers in the standardization sample.
