
Speed Queen Front Load Washer Troubleshooting

Washer Will Not Start or Turn On

Ensure the power cord is securely plugged into a functioning outlet. Test the outlet with another device, such as a lamp, to confirm it is receiving power. Washer Fills Slowly or Will Not Fill

If your Speed Queen front load washer takes an unusually long time to fill or does not fill at all, begin by checking the water supply. Verify that both the hot and cold water faucets connected to the washer are fully open. The fill hoses can become kinked or twisted, restricting water flow. Inspect the hoses from the wall to the machine and straighten any kinks.

Another common culprit is a clogged inlet screen. These small mesh filters are located where the fill hoses attach to the back of the washer. Over time, sediment and mineral deposits from your home's water supply can block these screens. Turn off the water supply, disconnect the hoses, and carefully remove the screens using needle-nose pliers. Rinse them thoroughly under running water and scrub gently with a soft brush if necessary. Reinstall everything and test the fill cycle. If the problem persists, the water inlet valves may be defective and will need replacement.

Washer Not Draining or Spinning

A washer that fills with water but refuses to drain or spin is one of the most common service calls. The first thing to

check is the drain hose. Ensure it is not kinked, clogged, or inserted too far into the standpipe. The hose should be positioned at a height between 30 and 96 inches off the floor to allow proper siphoning. If the hose is too low, water can drain out prematurely; if too high, the pump may struggle to expel water.

Next, inspect the drain pump filter. Speed Queen front load washers typically have a small access panel at the bottom front of the machine. Open this panel and locate the drain pump filter. Place a shallow pan or towel underneath to catch any water, then slowly unscrew the filter cap. Remove any debris such as lint, coins, buttons, or small clothing items that may be blocking the pump. Clean the filter thoroughly and replace it securely. If the pump is clear but the washer still does not drain, the drain pump motor may be burned out or the pump impeller may be broken. Listening for a humming sound during the drain cycle can indicate the pump is receiving power but is mechanically stuck or failed.

If the washer drains but will not spin, the issue often lies with an unbalanced load. Speed Queen washers have sophisticated load-balancing systems that prevent the machine from entering a high-speed spin if the laundry is unevenly distributed. Open the door, redistribute the clothes evenly around the drum, and try a drain and spin cycle again. For large bulky items like comforters or rugs, you may need to wash them separately or add a few towels to balance the load.

Excessive

Vibration or Shaking During Spin Cycle

While all front load washers vibrate to some degree during a spin cycle, excessive shaking or bouncing indicates a problem. The most common cause is improper leveling. Speed Queen front load washers have adjustable leveling feet at each corner. Place a bubble level on top of the machine and adjust each foot until the washer is perfectly level both front-to-back and side-to-side. Tighten the lock nuts once leveling is complete.

Another frequent cause of vibration is shipping bolts still being in place. If you recently installed or moved your washer, double-check that the transit bolts have been removed from the back of the machine. These bolts lock the drum in place during transport and must be removed before operation. Refer to your owner's manual for the exact location and removal procedure. Additionally, operating the washer on a weak or uneven floor can amplify vibration. Consider placing the machine on a rubber anti-vibration mat if floor stability is a concern.

Error Codes and What They Mean

Modern Speed Queen front load washers feature a diagnostic system that displays error codes on the control panel when a fault is detected. Understanding these codes is a critical part of **Speed Queen**

While specific codes vary by model, here are some of the most common ones:

- **F01 or F1:** This indicates a control board communication error. Try unplugging the washer for five minutes to reset the electronics. If the code returns, the main control board or user interface may need replacement.
- **F02 or F2:** This typically signals a drain problem. The washer has detected that water is not draining within a specific time frame. Follow the drain troubleshooting steps outlined earlier.
- **F03 or F3:** This code points to a water temperature sensor issue, often related to the thermistor. Check the temperature sensor wiring and connection.
- **F04 or F4:** This indicates a water level or pressure switch fault. The machine cannot detect the correct water level. Inspect the pressure hose for kinks or blockages and ensure the pressure switch is functioning.
- **F05 or F5:** This is a door lock error. The machine cannot confirm the door is properly locked. Inspect the door latch and lock mechanism for obstructions or damage.
- **F06 or F6:** This points to a motor or tachometer issue. The washer cannot achieve the correct spin speed. This often requires professional diagnosis.
- **F08 or F8:** This indicates a heating element fault in models with internal heaters. The water is not reaching the correct temperature.

Always consult your model's specific

error code chart in the owner's manual. Many codes can be cleared by unplugging the washer for a few minutes, but recurring codes indicate a persistent fault that needs repair.

Water Leaking From the Washer

Discovering a puddle of water around your Speed Queen front load washer is always concerning, but many leaks are easy to trace. Start by inspecting the door gasket or bellows. This rubber seal between the door and the drum can develop cracks, tears, or simply accumulate debris that prevents a proper seal. Wipe down the gasket regularly and check for small items like coins or paper clips that may be trapped. If the gasket is damaged, it will need replacement.

Next, check the fill hoses and drain hose connections. Ensure all hose connections are tight and that the rubber washers inside the hose fittings are present and in good condition. Leaks around the bottom of the washer often originate from the drain pump, which can develop a cracked housing or a loose connection. Access the pump through the front lower panel and inspect for any signs of moisture. Water can also leak from the detergent dispenser drawer if it is overfilled or if the drawer is not fully closed. Use only HE detergent in the recommended amount, and make sure the drawer is pushed in completely before starting a cycle.

Unusual Noises:

Grinding, Squealing, or Thumping

Your Speed Queen front load washer should operate relatively quietly during a cycle. Strange noises often point to specific mechanical problems. A grinding or metallic scraping sound during spin cycles may indicate a worn or damaged drum bearing. This is a more serious repair that typically requires disassembling the outer tub. A squealing noise during fill or drain cycles can be caused by a faulty water inlet valve or a struggling drain pump. Thumping or loud banging noises are almost always due to an unbalanced load or loose shipping bolts, but they can also indicate a broken suspension spring or shock absorber. Inspect the four corner suspension springs and the two shock absorbers at the base of the drum for any signs of breakage or wear.

PREVENTIVE MAINTENANCE TIPS FOR YOUR SPEED QUEEN FRONT LOAD WASHER

- **Use the correct detergent:** Always use high-efficiency (HE) detergent in the recommended amount. Too much detergent creates excess suds that can lead to poor cleaning, odor, and mechanical strain.
- **Level the washer periodically:** Check that your washer remains level, especially if you notice increased vibration. Floor settling or moving the machine can throw it out of alignment.
