Roman-Style Artichokes

Trim the artichokes, stuff them with garlic, mint, and breadcrumbs, then braise in olive oil and white wine in a covered pan before finishing uncovered. The high heat softens the tough leaves and infuses them with smoky flavor. You can also use the oven to char whole artichokes directly on the floor, turning them until blackened all over.

Roasted Roots and Squash

Root vegetables like carrots, parsnips, beets, and sweet potatoes caramelize deeply in a pizza oven. Cut into even pieces, toss with olive oil and herbs like rosemary or thyme, then roast in a pan for 15–20 minutes. The edges become sweet and crispy, while the centers remain tender.
