5. **Elementary Functions and Calculus Concepts (About 5%):** Limits, continuity, and introductory concepts of derivatives and integrals (conceptual, not computational).

It is crucial to note that the exam assumes a thorough knowledge of precalculus. Students who have not completed at least a semester of precalculus often find the test challenging.

- **Math Level 1** covers algebra, geometry (plane, coordinate, and three-dimensional), and basic trigonometry. It does not include

Step 1: Assess Your Starting Point

You have about 1.2 minutes per question. Many questions are designed to be solved quickly if you know the shortcut or formula. Learn to identify when a manual algebraic solution is faster than typing into a calculator.

TEST DAY TIPS FOR SUCCESS

On test day, your mental state and strategy can make a difference. Here are practical tips for the **Mathematics 2 SAT Subject Test**:

COMMON PITFALLS AND HOW TO AVOID THEM

- **Over-reliance on the calculator:** Many test-takers

- **Skipping the last few questions:** The difficulty does not linearly increase; sometimes the

last questions are easier than the middle ones. Do not leave them blank without at least scanning.

SCORING, PERCENTILES, AND WHAT COLLEGES LOOK FOR

Because the **Mathematics 2 SAT Subject Test** is taken by a self-selected group of high-achieving math students, scores are high. The average often hovers around 690 out of 800. To be competitive at top schools, a score of 750 or above is generally recommended, with 800 being ideal for STEM majors. According to College Board data, about 20–25% of test-takers score 800. That means you can miss several questions and still achieve a perfect score (the raw score needed for 800 is usually around 43–44 out of 50).

Colleges use subject test scores as a supplement to your GPA and the general SAT/ACT. A high Math Level 2 score can compensate for a lower math SAT score if your course rigor is strong
