It contains hundreds of pipes, yet it is designed to be moved, dismantled, and reassembled as the production tours the world.

In many productions, the stage organ is visually played by the actor, while the actual sound is produced by a digital organ or synthesizer controlled from the orchestra pit. every night. However, some special productions and concert versions have featured live pipe organs, creating a truly authentic and breathtaking experience. The sheer physical presence of a real pipe organ on stage adds an undeniable layer of realism and awe that digital samples can sometimes struggle to replicate.
