Essential Materials

8. **Open the top.** You have made an origami cup! It can even hold small, dry items.

Project 2: The

Origami Samurai Hat

This is a fantastic simple origami step by step project that looks more impressive than it is difficult. It builds directly on the cup design.

1. **Follow steps 1 through 5 from the Origami Cup instructions.** You should have a paper with the bottom corner folded up and the top corner folded down.
2. **Fold the top right flap down and to the left** so that its edge aligns with the center crease of the model.
3. **Fold the top left flap down and to the right** in the same way, aligning it with the center crease. The two flaps should now meet in the middle, resembling the brim of a hat.
4. **Fold the bottom point of the top layer up** as far as it will go, tucking it under the two brim flaps you just created.
5. **Flip the model over.** Fold the remaining bottom point up and tuck it into the pocket on this side.
6. **Open the base of the hat.** You have created an origami samurai hat! Decorate it with a small sticker or drawing.

Project 3: The Origami Fortune

Also known as a cootie catcher, this is a nostalgic and interactive simple origami step by step project that is perfect for playing with friends.

1. **Start with a square piece of paper, white side up.** Fold it in half diagonally both ways, creasing well and unfolding completely to create an X.
2. **Fold the bottom corner up to the top corner.** Crease well and leave it folded.
3. **Fold the left corner up to the right corner.** Crease well. You now have a smaller triangle.
4. **Unfold completely.** You should have a square with a clear X crease and a cross crease.
5. **Fold all four corners into the center point** where the creases intersect. This creates a smaller square.
6. **Flip the paper over.** Fold each of the four new corners into the center point again.
7. **Fold the entire square in half,** bringing the top edge down to the bottom edge. Crease well.
8. **Unfold that last fold.** Fold the square in half the other way, bringing the left edge to the right edge. Crease well.
9. **Gently pull open the four flaps** created by the folds. You will have a pocket for your fingers.
10. **Decorate the outer flaps with numbers** and write fortunes under the inner flaps.

TIPS FOR SUCCESS WITH SIMPLE ORIGAMI STEP BY STEP

Crease with Authority
