Credit Hour Requirements

Mason considers you a transfer student if you have earned at least 12 credits at a regionally accredited institution. Students

with fewer than 12 credits are typically admitted as freshmen and must submit high school transcripts and standardized test scores. For those with an associate degree from a Virginia community college, the transition is often streamlined thanks to guaranteed admission agreements and articulation pathways, which we will discuss later in this guide.

THE APPLICATION PROCESS: A STEP-BY-STEP BREAKDOWN

- **Personal Statement or Essay:** This is your opportunity to explain why you want to transfer to Mason and what you will bring to the campus community. Be honest and specific about your goals.

- **Letters of Recommendation:** While not always required, submitting one or two academic recommendations can strengthen your application. Choose professors or advisors who know you well and can speak to your abilities.

can apply well into the spring for fall admission. However, applying early is strongly recommended to secure housing, register for orientation, and enroll in classes. Priority deadlines are typically in February for fall and October for spring. Check the official Mason admissions website for the most current dates, as they can shift slightly from year to year.

Step 3: Pay Attention to Deadlines

Mason operates on a rolling admissions basis for transfer students, meaning you

TRANSFER CREDIT POLICY: WHAT COUNTS AND WHAT DOESN'T

One of the most critical sections of any George Mason University Transfer Guide is understanding how your previous coursework will transfer. Mason evaluates transfer

credits on a course-by-course basis. Generally, courses completed with a grade of C or better at a regionally accredited institution are eligible for transfer. However, not all credits will apply directly to your degree requirements.

General Education and Major Requirements

Mason has a set of general education requirements known as the **Mason Core**. Many community college courses are designed to align with these requirements, making it easier for

transfer students to fulfill them. Additionally, your major department will evaluate your previous coursework to determine which credits apply toward your major. This is why meeting with an academic advisor early in the process is invaluable. They can help you understand exactly how your credits will map to your degree.

Articulation Agreements with Virginia

Community Colleges

Mason has strong partnerships with the Virginia Community College System (VCCS). If you are transferring from a Virginia community college, you may benefit from guaranteed admission agreements and detailed articulation guides. These agreements ensure that certain associate degrees transfer seamlessly, allowing you to enter Mason with junior standing. This pathway is one of the most popular and efficient routes to earning a bachelor's degree at Mason. Be sure to check if your

specific program has a formal agreement in place.
