STEP 5: ASSEMBLE THE CROWN

Form the crown into a cylinder or dome shape. Apply glue to the tabs (if any) and press firmly. Hold the seam for 30 to 60 seconds to ensure a strong bond. If your **template for paper tricorn hat** includes a separate top piece for the crown, attach it now. Allow the crown to dry completely before moving on.

STEP 6: ATTACH THE CROWN TO THE BRIM

This is the most critical step. Most templates include a circular or oval opening in the center of the brim. Apply glue to the bottom edge of the crown or to the tabs around the opening in the brim. Carefully insert the crown into the hole. Press the brim flat against the crown base. Use clothespins or binder clips to hold the pieces together while the glue dries.

STEP 7: ADD THE COCKADE OR TRIM

Once the structure is solid, you can add decorative elements. A simple band of black or gold paper around the base of the crown adds instant authenticity. For a pirate look, add a skull-and-crossbones patch or a feather. For a colonial look, a simple ribbon bow or a buckle made from foil is perfect.

Creative Decoration Ideas

Pro Tip: If you are using paint or mod podge on your paper hat, apply it after the hat is fully assembled and dry. Wet paper can warp or tear, so use thin, even coats and allow each layer to dry thoroughly. A final coat of clear acrylic sealer will protect your

decorations and extend the life of your hat.

Troubleshooting Common Issues with Paper Tricorn Hats

- **Hat looks lopsided:** This usually happens when the crown is not centered on the brim. Before the glue sets completely, rotate the crown and make adjustments. Use a mirror to check the symmetry from all angles.
