- **Fabric:** Aida cloth is the most

easily through the holes in the Aida without splitting the threads.

- **Embroidery Hoop or Frame:**

This keeps your fabric taut and your stitches even. A 6-inch or 8-inch hoop is ideal for working on a stocking.

- **Stocking Template or Lining**

Kit: After stitching, you will need a fabric backing and lining to assemble the stocking. Many craft stores sell pre-cut stocking shapes or lining kits specifically designed for cross stitch.

- **Small, Sharp Scissors:** For snipping floss and trimming fabric.

A STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE TO STITCHING YOUR STOCKING

Creating a **Counted Cross Stitch Christmas Stocking** is a project of love, but breaking it down into steps makes it manageable and enjoyable.

1. **Prepare Your Fabric:** Cut your Aida cloth at least 3 inches larger on all sides than your pattern size. This gives you room for the hoop and for finishing. Find the center of your fabric by folding it in half twice.
2. **Read the Chart and Key:** Identify the center of the pattern chart. This is usually marked by arrows. Understand the color symbols and the stitch count.
3. **Thread Your Needle:** Separate your floss and use two strands for stitching on 14-count Aida. Do not knot the end of your thread. Instead, leave a short tail on the back of the fabric and secure it under your first few stitches.
4. **Start Stitching from the Center:** Begin at the center point you marked. This ensures your design is centered on the fabric. Make a single cross stitch (an "X") over one square of Aida.
5. **Maintain Consistent Tension:** Stitch with consistent tension. Your stitches should lie flat and not be too tight or too loose. An embroidery hoop helps achieve this.

6. **Stitch in Rows:** For efficiency, stitch in rows of half stitches (////) across the design, then come back to complete the crosses (\\\\). This creates a neat, uniform back.
7. **Follow the Chart**
Systematically: Use a highlighter to mark off completed stitches on your chart. This prevents errors and keeps you organized across a large project like a stocking.
8. **Complete the Design:** Work your way across the design. Finish all cross stitches, backstitch outlines, and any specialty stitches (like French knots for eyes or berries) as indicated on the chart.

TIPS FOR BEGINNERS STITCHING

THEIR FIRST STOCKING

- **Choose a Simpler Pattern:** Select a pattern with large, blocky areas of color and limited backstitching for your first stocking.

FINISHING AND ASSEMBLING YOUR STOCKING

For a professional finish, create a lining. Cut a lining fabric in the same stocking shape, sew it, and slip it inside the stocking, turning the top edge under and hand-stitching it in place. Finally, sew a

strong ribbon or piece of cording to the top corner for hanging. You can also add a decorative trim along the top cuff for an extra festive touch.
