COMMON PITFALLS TO AVOID IN LEVEL E

Misapplying Fraction Operations

One of the most frequent errors is treating all fraction operations the same. For example, $0.05 = \frac{5}{100} = \frac{1}{20}$, yet students may write $\frac{5}{10}$. Similarly, when dividing decimals, misplacing the decimal point is common (e.g., $4.2 \div 0.6 = 7$, but some might write 0.7).

Forgetting the Order of Operations

Level E introduces problems that combine fractions and decimals with parentheses. For instance, $\frac{3}{4} + (1.5 \times 2)$. Without a clear order, students may add before multiplying. Reinforcing PEMDAS with daily practice is essential.

STRATEGIES TO MASTER LEVEL E WITHOUT RELYING ON ANSWERS

1. Strengthen Fraction Fundamentals
