**THE ROLE OF POTENT POINTS IN A HOLISTIC** The role of the Potent Point is to open the heart, releasing emotional pain, and treating any condition related to the lungs or breathing. A feeling of a "heavy heart" or constriction in the chest often responds well to stimulation of CV17. It is a cornerstone point for treating grief, depression, and asthma.

- **Location:** On the midline of the sternum, at the level of the 4th intercostal space (approximately level with the nipples).
- **Key Actions:** Regulates Qi, opens the chest, calms the spirit, benefits the lungs.
- **Common Uses:** Asthma, shortness of breath, palpitations, depression, anxiety, breast tenderness.

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### HOW TO USE THESE POINTS FOR SELF-CARE (WITHOUT NEEDLES)
