

How To Build A Time Machine

Method 2: The Tipler Cylinder (Gödel's Rotating Universe)

Another theoretical model for a time machine is the Tipler Cylinder, also known as a Gödel universe vessel. This concept involves an infinitely long, extremely dense cylinder that rotates at incredible speeds.
