Breaking this cycle requires one person to take a step of faith—acting in love or respect even when the other person is not "deserving" of it. This is the "dying to self"

that Jesus spoke of, and it is the key to marital breakthrough.

Communication: The Bridge Over Troubled Water

Bishop Jakes is brutally honest about the fact that marriage is hard work. He admits that you will marry "the wrong person" in the sense that no one is perfect. The goal is not to find the perfect person but to learn to communicate and forgive in a way that allows two imperfect people to grow together. He emphasizes that:

1. **Listen to understand, not to reply.** Most conflicts arise because people are planning their rebuttal rather than hearing their spouse's heart.
