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# What Does Regroup Mean In Math

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### REGROUPING IN SUBTRACTION: BORROWING

## in Math Subtraction?

In subtraction, regrouping is often called "borrowing." It comes into play when the digit you are subtracting (the subtrahend) is larger than the digit you are subtracting from (the minuend) in a given column. For example, if you need to subtract 8 from 5 in the ones column, you cannot do that without borrowing from the tens column. So, what does regroup mean in math subtraction? The process remains the same: change one unit from a higher place into ten in the lower place, then continue.

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Many teachers introduce regrouping using physical objects such as base-ten blocks, counting chips, or place value charts. For instance, base-ten blocks represent ones as small cubes, tens as rods (10 cubes), and hundreds as flats (100 cubes). When adding 27 and 48, you can combine 7 ones cubes and 8 ones cubes to form one rod (10 cubes) and 5 leftover cubes. That rod is then moved to the tens column, representing the regrouped ten. - **Use graph paper or lined paper** to keep columns aligned. Misalignment is a leading cause of regrouping errors.

- **Explain the steps aloud** or write a sentence describing what you did. Verbalizing reinforces understanding.
