- **User Manuals and Quick Start Guide:** Printed documentation for reference.

Take a moment to inspect each item. If anything is missing or appears damaged, contact Dish Network support before proceeding. Keeping your original packaging is also wise in case you need to return or exchange any component.

PRE-INSTALLATION CHECKLIST: WHAT YOU NEED BEFORE YOU START

Successful installation begins long before you connect cables. A few minutes of preparation can save you from frustration later. Review the following requirements as outlined in the Dish Network Hopper Installation Manual.

Tools You May Need

- A Phillips-head screwdriver (for securing cables or mounting the dish).
- A coaxial cable stripper and compression tool if you are running new cables.
- A drill with masonry bits if you need to mount the satellite dish on an exterior wall.
- A level to ensure the dish is aligned correctly.
- A compass or satellite signal meter for fine-tuning alignment.

Location Considerations

Choose a central location for your Hopper receiver. It should be near your primary television and within reach of a power outlet. Ensure there is adequate ventilation around the unit; do not place it inside a closed cabinet without airflow. The Hopper generates heat during operation, and overheating can lead to performance issues or shutdowns.

Also, consider your internet connection. The Hopper benefits from a broadband connection for features like on-demand content, streaming apps, and software updates. If your Wi-Fi signal is weak in the chosen location, plan to use a powerline adapter or run an Ethernet cable.

STEP-BY-STEP INSTALLATION PROCESS

Step 1: Mounting and Aligning the Satellite Dish

If a dish is already installed from a previous service, you can skip this step. However, for new installations, proper dish alignment is critical. The dish must have a clear line of sight to the southern sky (in the continental United States) to receive signals from Dish Network satellites.

- Mount the dish securely on a wall, roof, or ground pole using the included hardware.
- Use a compass to find the approximate azimuth and elevation for your location. These coordinates are available on the Dish Network website or your installation guide.
- Attach the coaxial cables to the LNB (Low Noise Block downconverter) on the dish arm.
- Connect the other ends of the cables to the Hopper receiver. Most Hopper systems require two cables for full functionality.
- Power on the receiver and use the on-screen signal meter to fine-tune the dish alignment. Aim for signal strength above 70% on all relevant transponders.

Pro Tip: If you are not confident climbing a ladder or working with tools, hire a professional installer for the dish mounting.

Signal alignment is precise and can be challenging without experience.

Step 2: Connecting the Hopper to Your Television

With the dish in place and cables run to your Hopper, it is time to connect the receiver to your TV.

1. Plug one end of the HDMI cable into the HDMI port on the back of the Hopper.
2. Connect the other end to an available HDMI input on your television.
3. Plug the power cord into the Hopper and then into a surge-protected power strip or wall outlet.
4. Turn on your television and select the corresponding HDMI input.
5. Insert the batteries into your remote control and follow the on-screen pairing instructions.

You should now see the Dish Network welcome screen. If not, double-check that the correct input is selected and that all cables are firmly connected.

Step 3: Connecting to the Internet

The Hopper performs best when connected to the internet. This enables access to streaming apps, software updates, and interactive features.

- **Wired Connection:** Connect an Ethernet cable from your router to the Ethernet port on the Hopper. This is the most stable option.
- **Wireless Connection:** Go to the Hopper menu, select Settings, then Network Setup. Choose your Wi-Fi network and enter the password.
- **Powerline Adapter:** If your router is far from the Hopper, consider using a powerline networking kit that sends internet signals through your home electrical wiring.

Once connected, the Hopper will automatically check for software updates. Allow this process to complete; it may take several minutes. Do not unplug the receiver during an update.

Step 4: Activating Your Hopper Receiver

Activation is the final step and must be completed before you can watch live television or access recorded content. Dish Network typically handles activation as part of your service setup, but if you are installing a Hopper on an existing account, you may need to initiate it yourself.

1. Ensure the Hopper is powered on and connected to the satellite signal.
2. Call Dish Network customer service or use the online activation portal.
3. Provide the receiver ID and smart card number, which are printed on a sticker on the back or bottom of the Hopper.
4. Wait for the activation signal. This can take anywhere from a few minutes to an hour. The on-screen display will

indicate when activation is complete.

Once activated, you will have access to your subscribed channels, the program guide, and all DVR features.

SETTING UP ADDITIONAL ROOMS WITH JOEY UNITS

One of the greatest advantages of the Hopper system is its ability to extend service to other televisions in your home using Joey or Wireless Joey units. The installation manual provides specific instructions for connecting these companion devices.

Wired Joey Installation

- Connect a coaxial cable from a splitter near the Hopper to the Joey receiver.
- Power on the Joey and connect it to the TV via HDMI.
- Follow the on-screen prompts to pair the Joey with the Hopper.

Wireless Joey Installation

- Plug the Wireless Joey into a power outlet near the secondary TV.
- Connect it to the TV using an HDMI cable.
- Pair the Wireless Joey with the Hopper by pressing the Pair button on the Hopper and following the on-screen instructions.

All Joey units share the Hopper's tuners and recordings, so everyone in your home can watch different shows simultaneously.

COMMON INSTALLATION ISSUES AND TROUBLESHOOTING

Even with careful planning, you may encounter a few hiccups. Here are the most common issues reported by users and the solutions recommended in the Dish Network Hopper Installation Manual.

No Signal or Weak Signal

This is often due to dish misalignment, obstructions like trees or buildings, or damaged cables. Check the coaxial connections at both ends, ensure the dish has a clear view of the sky, and verify the signal strength in the settings menu. If the signal is below 60%, realign the dish.

Remote Control Not Responding

First, check the batteries. Then, ensure the remote is paired to the Hopper. Press and hold the System Info button on the remote until the LED blinks and follow the pairing prompt on the TV screen. If you are using a voice remote, make sure the microphone is not muted.

Internet Connection Drops

For Wi-Fi connections, try moving the Hopper closer to the router or using a Wi-Fi extender. For wired connections, check the Ethernet cable for damage and try a different port on your router. Restart both the Hopper and the router if the issue persists.

Activation Not Completing

If the activation process stalls or fails, verify that the smart card is correctly inserted. You may also need to provide Dish Network with the correct receiver ID. Wait at least 30 minutes after calling support before assuming there is a hardware problem.

MAINTAINING YOUR HOPPER SYSTEM FOR OPTIMAL PERFORMANCE

Once your Dish Network Hopper is installed and running, a little routine maintenance goes a long way. Keep the receiver in a well-ventilated area and dust it periodically to prevent overheating. Run a software check every few months via the Settings menu to ensure you have the latest features and security patches.

If you notice the DVR storage filling up, delete old recordings you no longer need, or transfer them to an external hard drive if your

model supports it. Regularly clearing the cache and reboot the system once a month can also resolve minor glitches before they become bigger problems.
