- **Base Stats:** Hit Points, Attack, Defense, Special,

and Speed values, allowing players to compare species.

- **Type Details:** A clear listing of strengths and weaknesses.
- **Evolution Requirements:** The exact level or item needed for evolution.
- **Level-Up Moves and TM Compatibility:** A comprehensive list of every move a Pokémon could learn.
- **Capture and Location Data:** Where to find each Pokémon in the wild, including the rarest encounters.

This section was essentially a pocket encyclopedia. Players would pour over these

pages, planning their dream team long before they had the time to grind the necessary levels. The data allowed for strategic team building, ensuring a balanced mix of types to counter any Gym Leader, Elite Four member, or rival battle.

Guide excelled in its final chapters, which focused on the endgame. It provided exhaustive strategies for defeating the Elite Four and the Champion. Each member—Lorelei, Bruno, Agatha, Lance, and the Champion—was analyzed in detail:

While the guide could not make the Surfing Pikachu obtainable, it explained the mechanics of the mini-game itself, making it a valuable resource for completionists.
