- Ouiser Boudreaux:** The town curmudgeon. Ouiser is perpetually grumpy, loud, and tactless, but beneath her gruff exterior lies a heart of gold. She is the "grumpy old woman" archetype perfected, providing hilarious conflict and raw, unfiltered truth.
- Shelby Eatenton-Latcherie:** The heart of the story. Despite her Type 1 diabetes, Shelby is vibrant, beautiful, and determined to live life on her own terms, even if it means risking her life to have a baby. Her sweetness and strength are the catalyst for the entire plot.
