UNDERSTANDING THE FACTORS THAT DRIVE VALUE

Before diving into specific items, it is critical to understand what makes one piece of memorabilia worth ten times more than another. The following factors are the most important determinants in any **Star Trek Collectibles Price Guide**.

Condition is King

The single most important factor is condition. For action figures still in their original packaging, the condition of the box (known as the card or blister) is everything. Creases, tears, price tags,

and sun fading can cut a value by fifty percent or more. For loose items, check for paint wear, broken parts, and missing accessories. A complete item in mint condition will always command the highest price.

Rarity and Production Numbers

Some items were produced in very limited quantities. Convention exclusives, prototype pieces, and items from the original 1960s run are naturally rarer. However, rarity alone does not guarantee high value. There must also

be demand. A rare but unpopular character might not sell for as much as a common but beloved character like Captain Kirk or Spock.

Provenance and Authenticity

If an item was owned by a cast member, used on set, or signed by the actor, its value increases significantly. However, the market is flooded with forgeries, especially for autographs. Always insist on a certificate of authenticity from a reputable source or a clear provenance trail. Items with screen-matched provenance (proven to have been used in a specific episode) can reach astronomical prices.

Market Trends and Nostalgia

The value of Star Trek collectibles fluctuates with nostalgia cycles. The Original Series items have been consistently valuable for decades. However, the 1990s boom of *The Next Generation*, *Deep Space Nine*, and *Voyager* has seen a resurgence as fans who grew up with those shows now have disposable income. Similarly, the modern era has created a new wave of collectors for *Discovery*, *Picard*, and *Strange New Worlds* merchandise.

ACTION FIGURES AND TOYS

This is the most accessible and popular

category for collectors. The range of price is enormous, from a few dollars for a common figure to thousands for a rare mint-in-package example.

Mego Star Trek Figures (1970s)

Mego produced the first licensed Star Trek action figures in the 1970s. These 8-inch cloth-costumed figures are iconic. A complete, mint condition Mego Captain Kirk in the original packaging can fetch between **\$400 and \$800**. Rarer figures like the Klingon or the alien from "The Menagerie" can sell for **\$1,500 or more**. Loose, complete figures with accessories typically range from **\$50 to \$200**.

Playmates Star Trek Figures (1990s)

Playmates produced hundreds of figures during the 1990s, covering all the series of that era. Most common figures from *The Next Generation* are worth **\$10 to \$30** if mint in package. However, the line includes several rare chase figures and convention exclusives. The Playmates "Cyborg" Locutus of Borg, for example, can sell for **\$200 to \$400** in mint condition. The "Mirror, Mirror" variants and the "Captain Proton" set are also highly sought after.

Diamond Select and Modern Figures

Diamond Select produced high-quality figures and ships in the 2000s and 2010s. These have generally held their value well. A mint condition Diamond Select Kira Nerys can go for **\$80 to \$150**. The modern **Star Trek** figures from companies like McFarlane Toys and Exo-6 are still new to the market, but early releases like the McFarlane *Strange New Worlds* figures are already showing signs of appreciation, with some exclusives reaching **\$60 to \$100**.

MODEL SHIPS AND VEHICLES

The USS Enterprise is one of the most recognizable ships in science fiction history. Model ships are a cornerstone of any serious collection.

Original Series Enterprise (AMT and Polar Lights)

The original AMT model kit of the USS Enterprise from the 1960s is a classic. An unbuilt, original AMT kit in good condition can sell for **\$100 to \$300**. A built and professionally finished model can be worth more depending on the quality of the work. The Polar Lights

reissued kits are more affordable, generally **\$30 to \$60**.

Master Replicas and Eaglemoss Ships

The Eaglemoss collection, which produced die-cast starships for every series, became incredibly popular. With the company having gone through changes, the secondary market has seen price spikes. Some of the rarer Eaglemoss ships, like the ISS Enterprise (XXXL edition), now sell for **\$300 to \$500**. Standard issues are typically **\$20 to \$50**. The Master Replicas studio-scale

Enterprise is a grail piece for many, with the large model selling for **\$2,000 to \$5,000** depending on condition and edition number.

Hand-Built Custom Ships

Many collectors seek out hand-built custom ships made by skilled artisans. These can range from **\$500 to \$10,000** or more for a museum-quality replica. The value depends entirely on the reputation of the builder, the accuracy of the build, and the materials used.

PROP REPLICAS AND COSTUMES

For the serious collector with a larger

budget, prop replicas and screen-used costumes are the ultimate prize.

Phasers and Communicators

Licensed prop replicas from companies like **Master Replicas** and **Diamond Select** are popular. The Master Replicas TOS Phaser (Special Edition) can sell for **\$400 to \$800**. The Diamond Select TNG Phaser and Communicator sets are more affordable, typically **\$100 to \$250**. Signed and numbered collectible editions fetch a premium of twenty to thirty percent.

Screen-Used Props

This is where prices become extraordinary. A screen-used Starfleet communicator from the Original Series sold at auction for over **\$50,000**. A Borg costume piece from *First Contact* can range from **\$5,000 to \$15,000**. Even a small prop like a data slate from *Deep Space Nine* can sell for **\$1,000 to \$3,000**. Authenticity is absolutely critical in this category.

Costumes

Screen-worn costumes are among the most valuable Star Trek items. An

Original Series command gold tunic worn by William Shatner can sell for **\$20,000 to \$100,000** depending on condition and provenance. Modern screen-worn costumes from *Discovery* or *Picard* are more accessible, ranging from **\$2,000 to \$10,000**. Complete uniforms with all accessories are worth significantly more than a single piece.

AUTOGRAPHS AND SIGNED MEMORABILIA

Collecting autographs is a popular entry point for many fans. Prices depend heavily on the actor's popularity and the item's format.

Key Cast Members

A signed 8x10 photo of William Shatner can be found for **\$50 to \$150** from reputable dealers. Signed photos of Leonard Nimoy (who passed away in 2015) have increased significantly and now range from **\$100 to \$300**. Autographs from the *Next Generation* cast are generally more affordable. A signed Patrick Stewart photo is typically **\$75 to \$200**. A full cast signed photo of the TNG bridge crew can sell for **\$500 to \$1,500**.

Multi-Signed Items

Items signed by multiple cast members are highly desirable. A model of the USS Enterprise signed by Shatner, Nimoy, and the rest of the TOS cast can sell for **\$1,000 to \$3,000**. The more signatures and the rarer the actor, the higher the value. Be extremely cautious with multi-signed pieces, as they are frequently faked.

Inscription and

Event Signatures

An autograph that includes a personal inscription ("Live Long and Prosper," "To my favorite fan," or a specific line from the show) can add fifty percent or more to the value. Signatures obtained in person at conventions are generally considered more valid than those from online dealers, though many online dealers are legitimate.

COMICS AND BOOKS

Star Trek has a rich history in print media, from the early Gold Key comics to modern IDW series.

Gold Key Comics Covers (1967-1979)

The first Gold Key comic, **Star Trek #1** from 1967, is a collector's item. A high-grade copy (CGC graded 9.0 or higher) can sell for **\$2,000 to \$5,000**. Lower-grade copies are much more affordable, with a reader copy available for **\$20 to \$80**. The series has several key issues, but #1 is the most valuable.

Modern Variant

Modern Star Trek comics from IDW feature many variant covers, especially for milestone issues and events. A rare variant cover signed by the artist can sell for **\$50 to \$200** on the secondary market. The *Star Trek: Lower Decks* and *Strange New Worlds* tie-in comics have also seen strong demand from collectors.

Technical Manuals and

Reference Books

The *Star Trek: The Next Generation Technical Manual* from the 1990s is a valuable reference. A first edition in good condition can sell for **\$50 to \$120**. The *Star Trek Encyclopedia* and the *Mr. Scott's Guide to the Enterprise* are also collectible, with first editions fetching **\$30 to \$80**. Signed copies command a premium.

TRADING CARDS AND MEMORABILIA

Trading cards are a fun and relatively affordable way to collect, though complete sets and chase cards can be valuable.

Star Trek: The Original Series Trading Cards (1976)

The first Star Trek trading card set, produced by Topps in 1976, is a classic. A complete, near-mint set can sell for **\$200 to \$500**. Individual cards of key characters in high grade can sell for **\$20 to \$50** each. The "Warp Factor" chase cards from the 1990s sets are also popular, with the complete set of 9 cards fetching **\$100 to \$200**.

Autograph Cards

Many modern trading card sets include

autograph cards inserted at random. These are highly sought after. An autograph card of Patrick Stewart from a 2019 Rittenhouse set can sell
